# VIRTAUL FILM MAKING SCHOOT SIX WEEKS COURSE OUTLINE

Here's a structured six-week online filmmaking workshop outline, with three classes per week, perfect for beginners to intermediate filmmakers looking to strengthen their storytelling, technical, and production skills.

Week 1: Introduction to Filmmaking & Visual Storytelling

- Class 1: Way of seeing

Week 5: Sound Design & Production Sound
